PREPOSITIONS OF PLACE

How we use 'in' as a preposition of place.

We use the preposition 'in' for an enclosed space or a place which is surrounded by boundaries.

Examples are:

1. I live in the centre of Paris.



2. She left her bag in the office.



3. It was made in China.



4. The milk is *in* the refrigerator.



How we use 'on' as a preposition of place.

The preposition 'on' is used to talk about the position of something on surfaces like walls or tables. My phone is *on* the table. You can see a painting *on* the wall behind me. We live *on* the fourth floor of the building.

Examples are:

1. We walked *on* the beach.



2. There are many pictures *on* the wall.



3. Have you ever walked *on* the Great Wall of China?



4. She has a cottage *on* the coast.



5. I found it *on* the internet.



6. The snow lay *on* the ground.



How we use 'at' as a preposition of place.

'At' is one of the most common prepositions in English. 'At' tells us that the noun following is located at a specific point or location.

Here are some examples:

1. She's waiting for her daughter *at* the airport.



2. The coach station is *at* 164 Buckingham Palace Road.



3. Can we meet *at* the restaurant because I'm going to be late?



4. I have an appointment *at* the dentist in the afternoon.



Whether to choose 'at' or 'in' as a preposition of place.

Sometimes it's confusing whether to pick 'at' or 'in' as a preposition of place. While 'at' is used for a specific location or address, 'in' is typically used describing a location that's inside of something:

- a. We live in the United Kingdom.
- b. My university is in London.
- c. My girlfriend lives in Soho
- d. The dog is *in* the car.
- e. We swim in the pool.
- f. The keys are *in* my bag.

'At' can also be used as a preposition of time. It's almost always a specific time:

1. The train arrives at ten past two.



2. Let's meet at Stonehenge at sunrise.



When to use 'at', or when to use 'in' or 'on' can be confusing when talking about time:

- 1. As we've seen, 'at' is used with specific times of the day:
 - a. 'I always eat lunch at midday.'
 - b. 'Let's meet at 5 pm.'
- 2. However, you need to use 'in' when referring to a period of time in the future:
 - a. 'The essay will be finished in three hours' time.'
 - b. 'I'm going to visit Vietnam in six months' time.'

Or for months, years, centuries and long periods:

- a. My birthday is in May.
- b. I was born in 1962.
- c. Victoria was born in the last century.
- d. *In* prehistoric times, dinosaurs roamed the earth.

'In' is used with specific time expressions referring to the morning, afternoon and evening. However, you must remember to use 'at' with 'night':


- a. He usually starts work early in the morning
- b. Let's talk about this *in* the afternoon
- c. I always have dinner in the evening
- d. I don't sleep well at night.
- 3. 'On' is used on days and dates:
 - a. I'm meeting him *on* Sunday
 - b. Christmas day is on December 25th
 - c. I love presents on my birthday
 - d. Let's party on New Year's Eve
